Aiming high

Some Russell Group universities try harder than others to attract strong state school students

Eg. Contextual offers made to students who meet specific criteria (eg neighbourhoods with low university uptake)

Eg. Newcastle runs the “Newcastle Partners Programme”, making offers up to 3 grades lower for eligible students who complete a summer programme with them after A Levels

Predicted Grades

Predicted grades for use in applications are made in July, using all available information.

Costs involved in going to university:

☐ Tuition fees

☐ Living costs

Tuition Fees

- Mostly £9535 per year
- No money needed upfront
- Tuition fees loan available to all, paid directly to the university
- £25,000 repayment threshold

Research stage

An example:

A student finishes their degree in July 2029 and gets a job with a salary of **£30,000**.

Their salary is **£5000** over the **£25,000** repayment threshold, so they pay **9%** of £5000 that year.

= **£37.50 per month**

Research stage

Living Costs

- **Maintenance loan**
 - 65% available to all: 35% means-tested
- **Extra support:** (money that isn't paid back)
 - University scholarships
 - University bursaries
 - Government allowances (eg Disabled students' allowance)

can apply to up to 5 courses

How should I decide on the range of grade offers to aim for?

- In July, students will receive predicted grades to use in the UCAS applications
- We advise students to look for courses asking for grades ranging from 1 grade above these predicted grades to 2 grades below them

Eg. Predicted grades = BBC

Courses to aim for = BBB to CCC

Or you could use points from AS / EPQ / Finance as well:

Geography	(B)	= 40
English	(C)	= 32
Business C Tec	(Merit)	= 32
EPQ	(C)	= 16

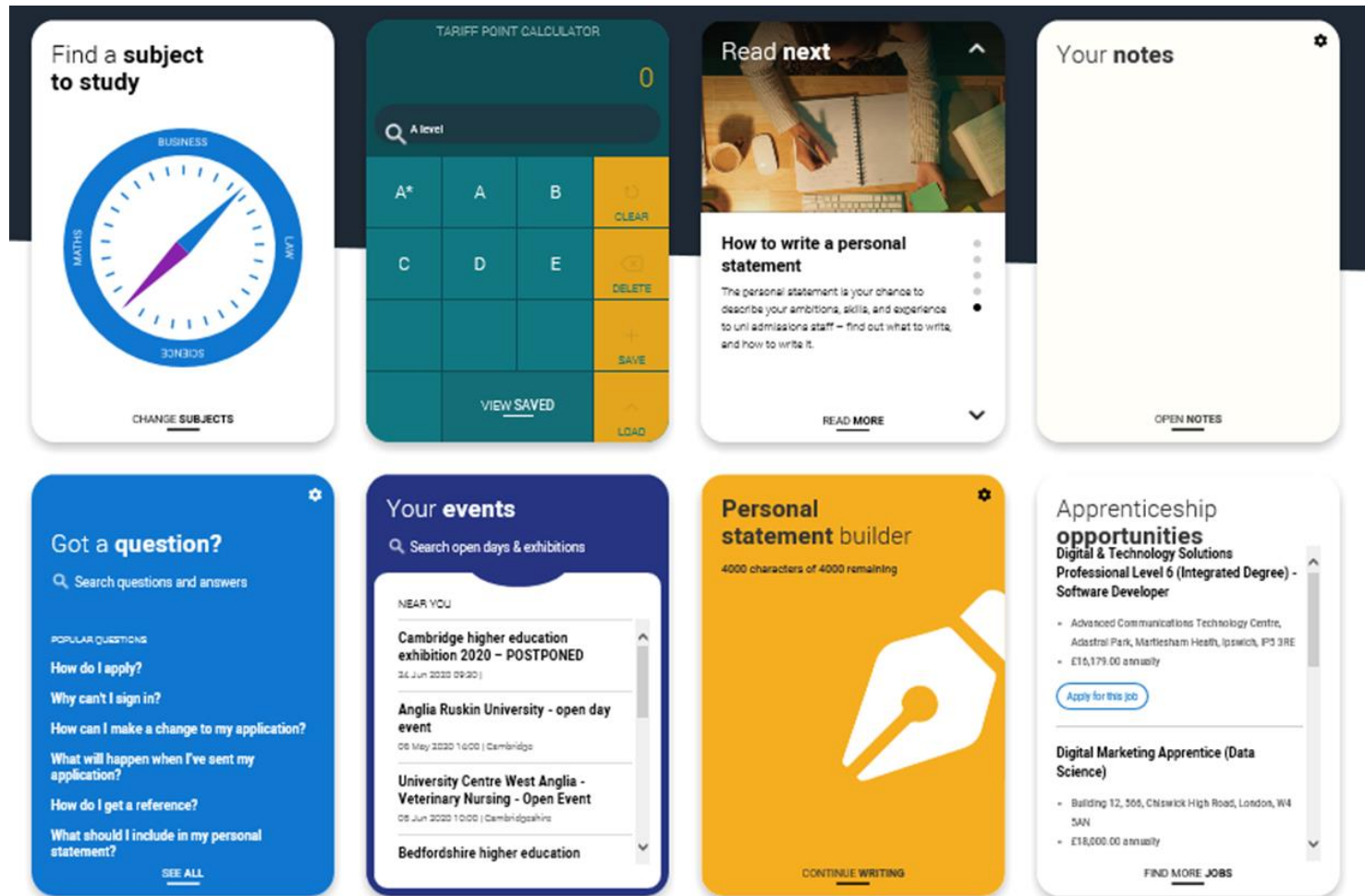

As well as grades, some
degree courses also
require entrance tests

- Most courses at Oxford and Cambridge, plus...
- Some courses in:
 - Medicine (UCAT and BMAT)
 - Maths (STEP and MAT)
 - Law (LNAT)
- Check whether the courses you are interested in require any entrance tests. Most of these tests will be sat in October. It is students' responsibility to check whether any of their courses require entrance tests.

Responding to offers

What happens once the application has been submitted through UCAS?

- Each university will respond in one of four ways:
 - Make a conditional offer
 - Invite to interview before making an offer
 - Make an unconditional offer
 - Decline to make an offer
- Students track the progress of application online
- When ALL universities have responded...
 - ... accept one offer as your **firm choice** and one as an **insurance choice**.



Responding to offers

Student Finance applications

- Apply by May of the year you will start university
- Applications open in March (takes 30 minutes)
- Helpful to do it alongside a parent or carer, as you need details of household income

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
